

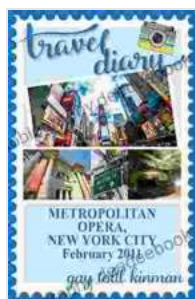
# Embark on an Enchanting Musical Journey: A Travel Diary of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City, February 2024
