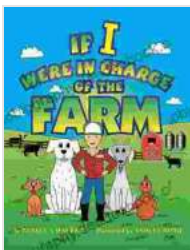

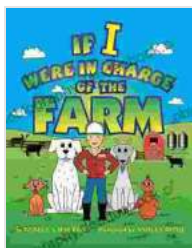
Recommendations
